Biola Groundwater Recharge Project

The intent of this Project is to convey surface water from Fresno Irrigation District's (FID) Herndon Canal to the District's storm drain basin for groundwater recharge. Construction of turnout on FID's Herndon Canal and installation of an 18" pipeline in 3rd Street from the turnout on the Herndon Canal north of Shaw Avenue to F Street, where it will connect with the District's storm drain system at a later date (upon completion of the 18" pipeline segment to be installed in 3rd from G Street to F Street as part of the new water storage tank project). This project is funded by the Department of Water Resources (DWR) Sustainable Groundwater Planning Grant (SGWP). The DWR is the lead state agency responsible for ensuring compliance with the regulations of CEQA, which requires that state and local agencies consider the impacts of their actions on the environment, including cultural resources.

The Biola Community Services District (District) is a public entity organized under the provisions of Section 61000 of the California Government Code formed in 1962 to provide water, solid waste disposal, storm drain, community center, and street light services for the unincorporated area of Biola. There are currently an estimated 315 water and wastewater connections in the District providing service to residential and industrial customers.

Biola is approximately 13.6 miles northwest of Fresno. The District's boundaries contain about 242 acres, and its Sphere of Influence is about 255 acres. The population is an estimated 1,623 with the population rising during the harvest season for local agriculture.
